Henry, the Navigator: prince of the seven seas

Being the principal mentor of the Discoveries, Henry, the Navigator wrote one of the most important pages in Portuguese History.

Always represented with his Burgundy-style hat and his eyes kept on the horizon, Prince Henry was born in Porto, in 1394, and left his mark in several parts of the country. Son of King João I, Henry is also responsible for fostering a generation of fearless navigators.

This one-week journey takes us to these special places and stories.

DAY 1 Porto

Departure from place and time to be agreed [earlier check-in recommended]. Our adventure begins in Porto, the birthplace of one of the Inclita Geração [Illustrious Generation]: Prince Henry. We visit the imposing cathedral and its artistic treasures. We have a glimpse of the medieval Tower of D. Pedro Pitões, hidden between houses till 1940. We walk along the old fence to Santa Clara church, a temple of Gothic origins. We unveil the entrance to the Fernandina Wall, from where we can admire the city, the Douro River from D. Maria Pia Bridge to the Gaia Quay, and the D. Luís I Bridge. Free time to lunch in Ribeira. We visit Casa do Infante, the house where Henry, the Navigator was born. We cross the Douro River and enter the Caves of the world-renowned Port Wine. Our day ends dining aboard a Rabelo boat. Return to departure point or hotel.

DAY 2 Viseu > Batalha

Departure to Viseu. Arrival at Viseu. This was one of the cities of Henry, the Navigator and First Duke of Viseu. During the entire day, we make a passionate tour through the origins of the city, its identity, shape and substance. Lunch. Departure to Batalha. Hotel check-in. Dinner.

DAY 3 Batalha > Tomar > Lisboa (night)

Hotel check-out. The Monastery of Batalha is, not only the greatest expression of Portuguese gothic architecture, but also the place chosen by King João I for a family Pantheon. Therefore, we visit the place where Henry, the Navigator rests for eternity. Departure to Tomar. Lunch. We visit the magical castle and Cristo Convent in Tomar. The castle was built in 1160 and it was donated to the Templars, by King Afonso Henriques. With the extinction of this order, on the 14th century, a new one arose: the Order of Christ. Prince Hen-

ry became its governor. From that time on, one of the most extraordinary moments of Portuguese History began, with the discovery of new continents and oceans. Henry granted knights the possibility of becoming navigators and navigators becoming knights of the Order. Departure to Lisbon. Hotel check-in. Dinner.

DAY 4 Lisbon

Our journey through the life of the Prince Henry ends at the maximum exponents of the Discoveries architecture style: Jeronimos Monastery and Belem Tower. This monuments are the memory guardians of a golden generation led by the Navigator, who challenged oceans looking for new worlds, giving birth to globalization. The Discoveries and the contacts with foreign people are forever carved in this walls. Another highlight is the visit to the Monument of Discoveries. Free time for lunch.

We admire the famous Saint Vincent Panels at the MNAA – Museu Nacional de Arte Antiga, where we find the only representation of Henry, the Navigator. Free time to dinner.

DAY 5 Departure from Lisbon > Arrival to Porto
